Superintendent's Column:

It is hard to believe that the 2023-24 school year is coming to an end and soon we will begin our summer programming. It is always a bittersweet moment to see our seniors graduate and close the chapter of their K-12 learning journey. Yet, with every closing chapter, a new one begins. We wish the graduating seniors well in their journey, wherever it leads them and look forward with anticipation to the next year of learning. Congratulations, seniors!



Superintendent

Over the summer, we will have a number of activities occurring in the District. There will be a crew working on the trailhead at the end of E Lake Ave and 5th St to correct the damage due to erosion, which will make this trail safer to access and use by students, staff, and the community. Construction is slated to begin on June 10. There will also be a construction crew present in June/July to replace sections of the roof that have lasted well beyond their normal lifespan. The maintenance team has done a great job of maintaining our roofs but these sections above the HS gym, locker rooms, music rooms, and mechanical areas need to be replaced to avoid potential damages from roof failure. The roof will have safety markers around the areas affected and efforts will be made to minimize impact on our summer programs. Additionally over the summer the District is planning to liquidate some excess materials and supplies currently stored in our garages on the west side of the building in order to use this space for vehicle storage. Over the years, a number of things have accumulated and some items are becoming unserviceable due to storage conditions within the garages. We will be evaluating items to determine what we need to keep and what needs to be sold while they are still serviceable. Unserviceable items will be liquidated in a manner that will benefit the District. Lastly, we will have our normal summer school schedule beginning on June 17. There are a number of great things planned for students attending summer school and I look forward to seeing our students during this time. If you have any questions regarding programming, please contact the District Office and we will be happy to help you get more information.

In July, the School Board will continue developing the District strategic plan that will drive our planning, work, and focus for the District. We received a number of responses to the survey sent out to families and posted in the community. I would like to thank everyone who submitted a response as this will help the Board develop their 5-year strategic plan to include the Mission, Vision, and Commitments of the District. This will help staff align our 5-year academic and social/emotional learning plan with the District Mission, Vision, and Commitments. The 5-year academic and social/emotional learning plan will focus on developing priority learning standards and aligning our instruction for all students in ELA (English Language Arts), Math, Social Studies, and Science. It will focus on clear, consistent expectations for the behaviors of all students and recognizing the good things staff and students do through our Positive Behavior Interventions and Strategies, which will be displayed around the building. All of this work will be connected to the District strategic plan with goals that address our commitments. The strategic plan will be released as soon as it is complete in the fall.

Finally, I want to recognize all of the great things our students do outside of the classroom. Our middle school and high school athletes have excelled in all sports with a number of teams achieving post-season awards and/or appearances. The boys cross country team achieved 2nd place in the state along with a top 10 finish by Isaac Dickenson. The boys basketball team made a first-ever state tournament appearance. The 7th and 8th grade girls basketball club team had a state tournament appearance and won 6th place. The softball team has won its 4th straight conference title along with an appearance in the regional finals. The baseball team has won its 4th straight conference title as well. A group of students started a chess club that meets weekly and are looking to participate in regional tournaments next year. The band and choir have been increasing in size and proficiency. All of these accomplishments speak volumes about the character of our students, staff, and coaches. I am very proud of their accomplishments and applaud the great things happening in Solon Springs!



It has been an absolute pleasure to coach this track team. They have all worked hard, tried new events, competed at and beyond the local competition, and had great success. We have a well-rounded group with 10 boys and 11 girls. We have a great mix of sprinters, hurdlers, jumpers, throwers, and distance runners.

From Solon Springs, we have Sprinters: Cade, Brandt, and Tristan. Jumper and Hurdler: Tarver Distance Crew: Aubrey, Annika, Dylan, Jake, Silas, and Isaac and Throwers: Logan and Gavin. Even though we put them in these categories because the majority of their time is spent doing those events, a lot of our athletes will step up and do an event that they haven't tried before or that we as coaches want them to try. They are an incredible group of individuals to work with.



MOCK TRIAL

Each year in Mr. In Rajala's Civics class, Mr. Rajala sets up a Mock Trial for the 9th graders to put on. They all take their part in acting out the mock trial either being attorneys, witnesses, or the defendants. All witnesses have to write up their own statement to read to the court which includes a Judge (Mr. Ryder) Jury Panel (Seniors) and a bailiff (Mr. Rajala).



Once completing this project they go back to the classroom and debrief the trial and see what went well, what they all learned and what could be changed for future classrooms. This interactive type of learning really helps the students learn about the judicial system and how the process works.

Learning often takes Eagles Academy students beyond the four walls of the classroom. For EA middle school student Kairi, her project unintentionally led her and her classmates to an area very important to the St. Croix watershed. Last semester, Kairi began with the question, "How can I adopt a highway?" Through reading, research, interpreting maps, interviews, and many phone calls, she learned that a stretch of County Road A was available to adopt. After filling out the County's application, a sign acknowledging Kairi soon went up. While Kairi would have been happy to adopt any stretch of the highway, she was excited when she learned how her section directly linked with the headwaters of the St. Croix, a watershed improvement project that students had started last school year. Last year students worked with Solon Springs Forward to expand the rain garder directly below the parking lot of the library to help filter runoff. The students at Eagles Academy understand how the water in our "backyard" and how we take care of it directly impacts the waterways in our community, as well as how our waterways connect with a larger, global watershed. When Kairi was asked why she wanted to take on this project, she stated, "If no one else wants to do it, you should!"

Elementary Art

This month Solon Springs Elementary and Montessori students have been learning about Rhythm, Pattern, Contrast, Balane, Emphasis and Space in art.

The 4K and Children's House 4k students are learning that repeating shapes in their art can create rhythm in their work. They created these super fun sunflower puppets and repeated the petals of the flower over and over again to create rhythm. I love how they turned out!

The Children's House Kindergarten and Traditional Kindergarten are learning about patterns. They created these amazing tropical fish using a variety of patterns. They were fun to make and these students did a great job.

The first and second graders are learning that opposites create contrast in their artwork. They used Black vs. White to create these Puppy collages. They are so cute and they each have their own personality. Love them!

The third and fourth graders are learning about Radial Balance. They watched a video on Tibetan Sand Painting and learned how to create a Radially Balanced design. They used both lines and shapes to create their own radial mandala. They did a fantastic job.

The Montessori E1 students are learning about Emphasis. They created these floral teapots that are larger than life. They used many line designs as well to create these beautiful teapots. They turned out great.

The fifth graders are learning about Balance. They created these Churches using symmetrical balance and the rose window in the church is radially balanced. They drew half of the church and traced it to the other half of the paper so that it was symmetrically balanced. They used old CD's to create the rose window. This was a fun project and I love their work.

GRADE 5 TO WOLF RIDGE

Each year, fifth grade students in Legacy and Montessori classrooms travel to Wolf Ridge Environmental Learning Center in Finland, MN. Students are immersed in the natural environment for the three day trip. The instructors involve the students in discussion, observations, and exploration. The students learned what voyageurs in the 1780s experienced, how and why beavers create dams, and constellations. Some of the favorite parts were the rock climbing course where students learned how to belay a partner who was climbing up the rock wall and how to slowly lower them to the ground and the ropes course were they were soar 40 feet in the air and zipline!




